## Prezidentův komentář/President's Notes By Judy Aubrecht Vážení členové Sokola a přátelé / Dear Sokol members and friends,

It has been my honor to serve as the president of Sokol Minnesota for the past five years, from 2014 to 2018. The Sokol Minnesota by-laws have term limits and I have reached the end of my term. I sincerely appreciate all of the support, kind words, and assistance that I have received over these five years from Sokol Minnesota members, the Board of Trustees, the Board of Directors, dedicated committees, program directors, and teachers. Working together toward common goals has enriched our organization and has led to continuing to maintain and enhance our beloved C.S.P.S. Hall and to the carrying on of successful programming to foster "a sound mind and a sound body."

In looking back to 2014, there were many building-related needs on which to focus and numerous planning meetings. The Glockenspiel Restaurant was closing and another renter was needed for the first-floor space. By July of 2014, a new lease was signed with head chefs Steve Hesse and Tyge Nelson, who were eager to start their own restaurant. Major renovations and upgrades were completed and the much-acclaimed Pajarito opened the following year. At the same time, the much-anticipated air conditioning project for the C.S.P.S. Hall was underway. Because of the age of the building and the desire to use existing ventilation pipes, the project was complicated and took many months to complete. Having an air conditioning system has increased the use of the building over the summer months and smiles from the brides who scheduled their wedding reception during this season. While the air conditioning project was nearing completion, a notification was received from the City of Saint Paul inspection's department reporting the 1919 fire escape did not pass inspection and the building would need to be closed for safety reasons. Creative planning was used after the existing fire escape was removed, to install a temporary fire escape. Eventually, an architecturally sound, sturdy, and attractive fire escape was installed. A new shed was built to provide a secure access to the building's basement and extra storage space for the restaurant. All of these projects were exceptionally costly and Sokol Minnesota's members and friends of the C.S.P.S. Hall continued to be very generous with their financial support for the needs of the building.

During all of this construction, on-going programming continued at the Hall. Folk dancing classes, gymnastics lessons, Czech and Slovak language classes, and the Senior Singers all continued. Educational programs, including cooking and craft classes, the children's Czech and Slovak School Twin Cities, and the Children's Cultural Day Camp took place. Events, including the annual Czech and Slovak Fall Festival, ethnic dinners and dances, pancake breakfasts and craft sales were held and much enjoyed by members and friends. Special outings were organized, including a 2016 trip for over 50 children, teens, and adults to the Ordway Theater to see the Minnesota Opera perform *Rusalka* by Antonín Dvořák. A special treat for this outing was a backstage tour and the chance to walk on the creative stage set to see how the "river" moved during the show.

A definite highlight during the past five years was the memorable visit of Czech Prime Minister Bohuslav Sobotka. This elegant and exciting day included lively programming and honored guests. As usual, our Sokol Minnesota volunteers and friends worked hard to make this a highly successful day. Another highlight was the recent *Slavnost* on October 13, celebrating and remembering the past 100 years since the establishment of Czechoslovakia in 1918.

Beginning in 2019, I will continue to serve on the Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors as publicity director. This position will be something new for me and there is much to learn from Sokol Minnesota members who have offered to share their skills in this area.

Looking ahead, you will want to visit the Czech Christmas display in the Music Room at the American Swedish Institute, in South Minneapolis, during the holiday season. Through our Czech Honorary Consul, Czechs received a special invitation to display our Czech Christmas traditions. The Saint Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers performed December 2 at 4 p.m. *Taneční Mládež* will perform on December 16 at 2 p.m.

The Membership Holiday Party, for members and volunteers, will take place on January 6, 2019, beginning at 12:30 p.m. A luncheon will be served and holiday activities will take place. New members are especially encouraged to come. Reservations by December 29 are required for this free event as seating is limited. Call 651-290-0542.

#### In Memory of Valeria Kuisle By Mary Cahill

Val was a proud Sokol Minnesota member for more than 50 years. She passed away on September 20, 2018, at the age of 94 years. Family legend has it that she was born in a house just a few blocks from the C.S.P.S. Hall. Her roots are well-connected to the Czech immigrant community, often referred to as Little Bohemia in the West 7th neighborhood. She also brought her three daughters into Sokol Minnesota while they were young children, introducing them to the special community of people and activities that Sokol Minnesota is all about. Stories from Val about her teen and young adult years revealed that she had

Stories from Val about her teen and young adult years revealed that she had several female friends that were life-long friends from her Sokol Minnesota community. She participated in gym classes while growing up, attended an instructor school, and helped in the gym program in her younger years. Val loved to be with people and participate in outings and celebrations of any kind. It was important for her to be a contributor. Her family helps with preparing the mailing of Sokol's *Slovo* newsletter, and Val was a regular part of the mailing party for many years, up until a few months before her death. Her assignment was to put the 551 zip code labels on the newsletters. Despite her increasing cognitive decline, she was still amazingly able to notice labels that didn't have all the information on them, detect duplicate labels, find the newsletters that had not been completely tabbed, and remind us that quality control was at stake.

Val loved to sing and dance and participated as long as she could in her beloved Czech and Slovak Singing group. She participated in the Senior's Marching group when it was still active, and attended Sokol Minnesota's Šibřinky dances annually, and as recently as two years ago, in her early 90's, danced the polka with her grandchildren. Undoubtedly the physical fitness that Sokol Minnesota promoted was key to her vitality and outstanding sense of balance in her advanced age.

Val was a familiar face at Sokol Minnesota. She had a smile that lit up the room. As one of the few remaining members of her generation, she will be missed, but she will also be remembered along with those who have passed before her. *Nazdar*, Val!

#### Czech Family Visit By Marcia Oltrogge

**Ed Hamernik**, along with his daughter, Marcia Oltrogge, and granddaughter, Alaina Oltrogge, recently visited his family in the Czech Republic. Ed's mother, Aloisie Dvorakova, emigrated in 1916 from the Humpolec area (about 100 kilometers southeast of Prague). She left behind two brothers and a stepsister whose families still live in the region.

A highlight of the trip was visiting with five first cousins. Ed's Czech, spoken at home many years ago and practiced more recently in Czech language classes at the C.S.P.S. Hall, helped him learn more about his mother and her early life in the Austro-Hungarian Empire at the time. Cousin Jarmila, now deceased, came to the United States in 1969; during her visit, she rode in a car for the first time in her life.



#### Kroje Style Show Honors 100 years on the 11th Hour of the 11th Day of the 11th Month

Slovak Sokol Minnesota, the St. Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers, and the Ethnic Dance Theatre (EDT), began at 11 a.m. to honor the peace treaty that ended World War 1. The treaty was signed on the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. The treaty also created several new and independent nations including Czechoslovakia. The toast also honored the traditional end of the harvest, the feast of St. Martin who is the patron saint of winemakers, and the tasting of the new wine. At 11 a.m., Co-chair Louise Wessinger introduced our emcee and presenter for the day, Don LaCourse, artistic director of Ethnic Dance Theatre. At precisely

11:11 a.m., Don led the traditional toast

Na zdraví (cheers). Following the toast, several wonderful canapés accompanied the red and white Moravian wines.

Sokol Minnesota hosted the celebration at the C.S.P.S. Hall. Co-chair Doreen McKenney planned the marvelous food and wine combinations, as well as producing the artwork for the show. Canapés were a date spread on pita crackers with prosciutto ham, mini quiche, a chicken, almond and cranberry mini peppers filled with sautéed onions and bacon topped with From Slovakia: Bobbie Jo Chandler, John Topic, Anne and

cheese, sour cream and garlic, olive spread on rye flat bread, and peach cobbler for dessert. Joan Sedlacek was able to obtain special Czech wine with the Alphonse Mucha labels from her Sokol friend, who is a wine broker in Chicago. 

- Enamel Jewelry: Minnesota jeweler Emily Chesick meticulously utilizes the ancient metalworking technique of cloisonné, in which colorful powdered glass is fused to a metal backing.
- Bobbin Lace: Czech-born Dagmar Beckel-Machyčková, living in Wisconsin, works with bobbin lace, breaking traditional boundaries to create contemporary pieces.

Clicking of the bobbins filled the Sokol class room on November 3 and 4. Nancy Wellington commented, "One of the wonderful things about this class was that there were students of all ranges of experience, from new lacemakers

to some with many years of lacemaking. We all had a wonderful time and learned a lot! I'm especially glad that we from the Minnesota Lace Society and members of Sokol were able to join forces."

One lace maker estimated that it takes her about one hour to make 1" of 1.5"- wide lace. At \$15/hour that is \$540 a yard. It is no wonder that lace-making by hand is no longer a viable profession.

Imagine what it would cost to make 15" wide lace (usually made in 2" to 3" wide bands, sewn together) for a blouse sleeve for a *kroj*. Lacemaking is definitely a labor of love. Thanks to Dagmar for a wonderful lacemaking weekend!

Bobbin lace is made on a "pillow" that functions as a large pincushion. Different types of pillows are used in different regions, as seen on the table (left): insulation foam board covered with fabric; cookie pillows (rounded circles); movable foam block pillow; large bolster pillow, probably stuffed with packed sawdust or chopped straw, common in central Europe; roller pillow, common in northern Europe, best for continuous edgings. The bobbins also vary by region; seen here are bobbins from Spain, Belgium, United States, and Slovenia.

## BOOK REVIEW By Gwen Willems, Ph.D. Falling in Love with Prague

A Romantic Education by Patricia Hampl. W. W. Norton & Company: New York. Re-issued in 1999 with an extensive new afterword; originally published 1981 by Houghton Mifflin. 352 pages. Available at libraries and bookstores.

When Patricia Hampl wrote about her Czech heritage in an early poem, she thought that was the last she'd be writing about the subject. But she has often returned to it. After publishing two books of poetry, Hampl released her first memoir, *A Romantic Education*, which is about her Czech heritage. This book and subsequent works, including her latest memoir, *The Art of the Wasted Day*, established her as an influential figure in the rise of autobiographical writing in the past thirty years. The Los Angeles Times dubbed her "the queen of memoir."

She writes, "Memoir is not what happened (if we're lucky, that's the best journalism). It is what has happened over time, in the mind, in the life as it attends to these tantalizing, dismaying, broken bits of life history. Such personal writing is, as the essay is, 'an attempt.' It is a try at the truth. The truth of a self in the world."

A Romantic Education describes her childhood in the Czechoslovak-American West Seventh Street area of Saint Paul, which was also fueled by trips to Czechoslovakia in 1975, 1977, and 1978. Her immigrant grandmother had a large impact on Hampl, who felt the urge to visit Prague after her grandmother's death.

The book is divided into three sections. The first is about the author's childhood, her Czech-American grandmother whose potent center was food, and the neighborhood F. Scott Fitzgerald also illuminated. The second section is a rumination on beauty. The third and longest is based on her first three trips to communist-era Prague, her long walks, and the people she befriends. Originally expecting to seek out her ancestors' villages and relatives, the author found something richer. As Hampl wrote, "The country itself becomes the lost ancestry and, one finds, the country is eloquent. Its long story,

its history, satisfy the instinct for kinship in a way that the discovery of a distant cousin could not. For it is really the longing for a lost culture that sends Americans on these pilgrimages."

The book is a beautiful read, all the richer the more you know about Czech culture and history and if you have visited Czech lands. She talks about so many sites that visitors to Prague cherish, such as the Charles Bridge, Old Town, the Prague Castle, the Municipal House, the Slavia coffee shop, and the Estates Theater where Mozart premiered Don Giovanni.

Hampl has received much recognition, including multiple *New York Times* Notable Book Awards. In addition, she was granted fellowships from the Guggenheim Foundation, Bush Foundation, National Endowment for the Arts, Ingram Merrill Foundation, the Djerassi Foundation, and others. In 1990, she was awarded a prestigious MacArthur Fellowship.

She is Regents Professor and McKnight Distinguished Professor at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, where she taught her final semester this fall in the MFA program of the English Department before retiring. The prolific author has written ten poetry and prose books and edited three.

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Remarks made by Honorary Czech Consul M. L. Kucera on the occasion of the *Czech 100 Celebration*, October 28, 2018, in New Prague. Similar remarks were made for *Slavnost* on October 13 at C.S.P.S. Hall in Saint Paul.

As Honorary Consul of the Czech Republic, I extend a warm welcome to everyone. Today, October 28, is the actual 100th anniversary of the formation of Czechoslovakia in 1918. Many of you yesterday visited one or more of the 12 cemeteries, here in Czech Country Minnesota, to celebrate

In their honor, we placed 1700 flags on the family plots of immigrants.

our forefathers and foremothers.

Czechs and Slovaks have much to celebrate. The creation of the sovereign state of Czechoslovakia in 1918 achieved a centuries-old dream and goal.

Twenty-five years ago, in 1993, the thousand-year dream of its own separate nation was realized by the Slovaks. For the Czechs, it had been only 400 years.

This extraordinary, peaceful movement known as the Velvet Divorce produced the Czech Republic and the Slovak Republic. Both countries have prospered and their peoples remain very close friends.

We have here today, both those who were born in these two Central European nations and also those whose grandparents, and even greatgreat-grandparents came from areas that are popularly known today as Slovakia and Czechia. Not just Bohemians, Moravians, and Slovaks, but also Carpatho-Rusyns, Romas, Silesians, Magyars, and several other ethnic groups.

While there is much to celebrate, there is also much we need to remember, to respect, and never to forget.

- 80 years ago, in 1938, the Nazis occupied Czechoslovakia and the horrors of WWII followed.
- 70 years ago, in 1948, the communists took over.
- 50 years ago, the 1968 Prague Spring reform movement brought great hope, but it was quickly squelched by the Soviet-led Warsaw Pact. For the next 20 years, life became even harsher in Czechoslovakia.

Today we are here to reflect, to remember, to recognize, to honor and to commemorate, but mostly we are here today to Celebrate together the wonderful homelands of which we are so proud.

Let us give a cheer for the Centennial of Czechoslovakia! Hip Hip Hurrah!!
