Claire began Sokol at seven years old as a participant in girls class at Sokol Minnesota. She joined her unit after listening to a recommendation from a

friend and is the first in her family to join Sokol! As she grew older, Claire made the competition team at ten years old and continues to train and compete on team. She remains very active in Western District events by often competing in Special Number and Gymnastics competitions as well as participating in the 2017 Iowa National *Slet*. Claire participated in the Central District Skills Clinic in 2019 and 2020, while also winning the "Best All-Around Female" award in 2020. Sokol Minnesota Heralds its 300th Member By Julie Wilbert

I first learned about Sokol when my mother began digging into genealogical research of her family line in Slovakia in 2014. She traced our lineage back to 1730, when the church records began. Her family immigrated to New York in the late 1800s. My greatgrandmother was Mary Marczinovich, age twenty when she arrived in New York from the village of Kuchyna in western Slovakia.

Previous to my mother's curiosity about ancestry, she brought me to the annual fall Sokol Minnesota Czech & Slovak festival. Being just 12% Slovakian (and an unknown percentage of Czech on my paternal side), I was not certain of the significance. However, the festival was beyond worth attending. The traditional dancing, music, food, silent auction, and 'All are Welcome' good cheer led me to want to know more about the culture. My then eight-year-old Norwegian/mixed daughter participated in the annual *koláče* jam-filled pastry eating contest and discovered that her best schoolage friend was a member of Sokol Minnesota's *Tanečni Mládež* (Dancing Youth).

Two years later, I registered my now 10-year-old daughter for the week-long summer Czech and Slovak Children's Cultural Day camp, where, in just one week, she learned to prepare traditional foods, learn some of the language, do gymnastics, juggle, and

even pull off a performance with her peers of a culturally-educational and festive theatrical show.

Sokol Minnesota, of course, is not the only organization where one can celebrate their heritage, but its significance reminds me of how much deeper we can delve into our ancestry.

New Eco-Shades By Joyce Tesarek For C.S.P.S. Hall's Third Floor

C.S.P.S. Hall updates continued this past month as the Hall staved closed to our usual Sokol activities in order to keep people safe from COVID infection.

A project we have discussed for many years was completed: purchase and installation of 11 Ultraviolet-Ray-Protecting Honeycomb E8 shades with power-wands. These attractive eco blinds cover the large windows of the third-floor mezzanine and will block the east and south sun, which will protect the historical artifact displays and photos. Controlling the temperature also makes the space more usable for meetings and classes.

The total cost for the eco blinds and installation was \$4,887. We gratefully accepted a grant for this project from the American Sokol Foundation for \$2,150, with the balance paid from the Sokol Minnesota General Fund.

Recap of the 40th Minneapolis St Paul International Film Festival By M. L. Kucera

The Minneapolis Saint Paul International Film Festival 2021 was held May 13-23. This 40th anniversary of MSPIFF, presented primarily virtually due to the pandemic, was considered a success according to Jesse Bishop. Programming Director. He provided the reservation and expected attendance numbers reported below for the three Czech and Slovak films, as well as their ratings and overall ranks based on the audience award balloting. The film attendance estimates are based on the survey findings that showed an average of two people per reservation.

Charlatan (Director Agnieszka Holland. Historical Drama category, Czech Republic and Slovakia. Languages: Czech and German with subtitles) had 100 reservations with an estimated attendance of 200. It received a 4.03 (out of 5) Audience Rating. It ranked #63 out of 104 feature length films. The Milgrom Tribute, named in honor of the late Al Milgrom, to Director Agnieszka Holland was live on Zoom and Facebook with an audience of 556 on May 16.

Havel (Director Slávek Horák. Historical Drama and Biography categories, Czech Republic. Language: Czech with subtitles) had 96 reservations with an estimated attendance of 192. It received a 4.02 (out of 5) Audience Rating. It ranked #69 out of 104 feature length films

Shadow Country (Director Bohdan Sláma, Historical Drama category, Czech Republic and Slovakia. Language: Czech with subtitles) had 50 reservations with an estimated attendance of 100, It received a 4.03 (out of 5) Audience Rating. It ranked #55 out of 104 feature length films. See the May issue of *Slovo*, page 8, for details on these

three films.

The local Czech and Slovak organizations and individuals that generously supported MSPIFF40 were Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota (CSCC), Czechoslovak Genealogy Society International (CGSI), Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities, the Honorary Consul of the Czech Republic M.L. Kucera, plus several individuals, including Sokol Minnesota members Blanka Brichta, John Palka, and Marshall Toman.

Both Jesse Bishop and Executive Director Susan Smoluchowski thanked the Czech and Slovak organizations and community for their ongoing support of Czech and Slovak film exhibition in the Twin Cities. The Film Society look forward to working with us again next year to support Czech and Slovak cinema. MSPIFF 2022 runs March 31-April 15, 2022.

Obituary: Bishop Peter Esterka

Peter Esterka, the Czech Catholic Bishop who came to New Prague to help celebrate 100/50/25 in 2018, died on August 10, 2021, at age 85, in California. Funeral masses were said both in Garden Grove, California, and also in Brno, Czech Republic. His burial is in his hometown cemetery in southern

Moravia in Dolní Bojanovice (just a few kilometers from the hometown of Sokol Minnesota member Markéta Pálkova, where the freak tornado struck in June. See August 2021 *Slovo*, page 3).

Esterka fled communist persecution from Czechoslovakia to Austria in 1957. His book, Never Say Comrade, describes his escape from Czechoslovakia. He studied for the priesthood in Rome and was ordained in 1963, then earned a doctorate in theology.

Many Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota members have connections to by Czech Heritage Junior Royalty 2018 and Bishop Esterka. He served in Minnesota directors Deb and Arnie Ziskovsky. (See for nearly 30 years before his December 2018/January 2019 Slovo, page 15)

appointment as an auxiliary bishop in the Czech Republic. His service to Czech Catholics began in Minnesota while he was on the faculty of the College of St. Catherine, now St. Catherine University, from 1967-1993. He also served at Immaculate Heart of Mary and St. Therese parishes in Saint Paul, plus making many trips to St. Wenceslaus Church in New Prague.

Bishop Esterka, who became a U.S. citizen in 1968, joined the 934th Airlift Wing Reserves in Minneapolis in 1974 as a military chaplain, retiring as a lieutenant colonel in 1995.

He began ministering to Czech immigrants in the U.S. and Canada in 1978. His dedication to Czech immigrants factored into his appointment in 1999 by Saint Pope John Paul II as

awarded the Gratias Agit award, given annually in Prague, to honor both individuals and groups that internationally promote the good name of the Czech Republic.



Pope Francis accepted his resignation as a bishop in 2013, but Esterka continued to minister to the Czech Catholic community until 2018 in the United States, Canada, and Australia. 2018 was the year Esterka returned to Minnesota to celebrate Mass in Czech at St. Wenceslaus in New Prague as part of a two-day festival celebrating the 100th anniversary of Czechoslovakia's formation (1918); the 50th anniversary of the Prague Spring Reform, the shortlived, but a significant era of political liberalization in Czechoslovakia (1968); and the 25th anniversary of the formation of the Czech Republic and the Republic of Slovakia (1993). That weekend

celebration included tours in 12 cemeteries in New Prague, Lonsdale, Montgomery and Veseli. More than 1,700 small Czech flags were placed on Czech immigrant graves.

JAROSLAV CERVENKA

Reluctant Witness by Jaroslav Cervenka. Xlibris, 2019, 250 pages. Available at libraries and bookstores.

The latest book written and published by our dear friend Dr. Jaroslav (Jarda) Cervenka is a memoir of his adventurous life. Cervenka gave one of the first talks sponsored by our book group almost twenty years ago; it was a fascinating overview of Czech and Slovak literature. In addition to this memoir, *Reluctant Witness*, he earlier wrote twelve books, most of which are collections of stories inspired by his real experiences.

As he wrote in *Reluctant Witness*, "None of my fifty-some stories are a pure fiction, all are based on real characters stumbling around in real localities.

Anyway, 'There are no stories which are not true (Chinua Achebe).'"

The "first half of life" in *Reluctant Witness* covers Cervenka's growing up and trying to go to university in Czechoslovakia, working in his home country, Nazi and communist oppression, and leaving Czechoslovakia. The "second half of life" includes getting settled in Minnesota, working as a geneticist, traveling throughout the world, retirement, and taking up fiction writing. This memoir is crammed with exciting scenes of history, exotic places, good friends, and literature. Six of his stories published earlier are

placed here in the context of his additional real-life memories. *Reluctant Witness* is an example of Cervenka's advice to "look for the truth, but nothing but the truth (do not be politically correct) ..." The unedited, self-published memoir is an unfiltered view of his life and the world as he sees it. Some of his views will offend readers.

Cervenka likes to live life to the fullest, including taking risks, as when he snuck out of a guard cabin in the middle of the night to make a forbidden climb up icy Mount Fuji in Japan. "I will not describe my climb but I only say that I made it to the top in no visibility, covered with cloud and light snow, crawling on my belly part way, my crampons hardly holding on the ice, my hands freezing, scared and fully knowing that even a slight loss of concentration will cause my demise and they will find me in the Spring, down in some ravine, after snow and ice will melt."

He traveled to many exotic places in the world, often for medical conferences and to provide services. Cervenka visited northern Canada, Polynesia, and Thailand; went diving in the South China Sea and the Indian Ocean; mountain climbed on Kilimanjaro in Africa, Mount Fuji in Japan, and Aconcagua in Argentina. Along the way, he has made the acquaintance of ethnic groups such as the Inuit peoples of Canada, the Cholos tribes of Columbia, South America, the Tamils of Sri Lanka, and many African tribes.

The stunning scenes he painted in *Reluctant Witness* also took place in Czechoslovakia. I was especially taken with him and his friend Jitka reminiscing: "Do you remember how we missed the train to Riesengebirge Mountains (Krkonose)?" Jitka asked. "That night, lots of snow fell in Prague—we put on skis and skied down Vaclavske Square.

People were freaking out applauding ... Do you remember? We might have been the first people to schuss down and finish with a telemark turn on the square in the 2000-year history of Praga (sic)...."

Jarda Cervenka was born and raised in Prague, graduated from Charles University with a Doctor of Medicine degree in 1956, and immigrated with his family to the United States in 1968. After serving as a professor of medical genetics at the University of Minnesota, he focused on fiction writing. In 1995 Dr. Cervenka published his first collection of short stories, *Mal d'Afrique and Stories from Other Places*. He has received several literary awards for his books of stories, novel, travel book, and book of photos. As he wrote about his life, "Existence. It was

a pretty exhilarating joy-ride, with a few sharp turns taken and in the second half, without a skid, downwind, on a sunny road."

Gwen is coordinator of the Czech and Slovak Literary Ventures book discussion group. Literary Ventures is cosponsored by the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota, Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, and the Office of the Honorary Consul of the Czech Republic.

Highlights of the Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota August Board Meeting By Denise Stibal

The virtual meeting was called to order on August 19 at 7:00 p.m. by President Dave Stepan.

The classroom is ready for use and we will have the third floor ready in time for the Czech & Slovak Festival.

Glynis Grostephan, Corresponding Secretary, reported that contributions to the General Fund in July were \$29.

Youth Group Activities are being planned with a "Trick or Trunk" scheduled for October 23 and possibly a curling event also in October.

Education Chair Pat Slaber reported that the blinds are installed on the third floor and all historic materials are sorted and labeled. Language Classes are scheduled to begin on September 27, with a hybrid model of zoom and in-person available. A smart TV is being purchased to facilitate.

Membership and Financial Secretary Chairs Norm Petrik and Steve Ernest reported that our membership has increased to 303. Our goal was to have 300 members by the Festival.

Treasurer Don Haselbauer reported our total balances in all accounts.

Board of Budget and Finance Chair Joyce Tesarek reported on income for the current year. When we included a transfer of \$40,000 from Gaming and \$8,934 in donations to the General Fund, we have a net income of \$40,345 year-to-date. We issued three checks for \$300 to our Youth Leadership Award Winners and one check for \$100 to the Best Essay winner.

For the Board of Instructors, Jason Brozovich noted that National Instructor School training has been completed. The brochure for fall classes is being finalized with many inquiries already received.

Building and Property Trustees Committee Chair Bob Kotek noted that fire inspection is completed and new double doors are installed for the first-floor west side entry. A discussion on new rugs for the entry was held and we hope to make a decision soon pending more information on colors available.

Gaming Chair Ed Hamernik reported that the July net income was \$7,452. Gaming, which has a profit carryover of \$41,039, will discuss a transfer of funds to the General Fund at its next meeting.

Activities Director Jean Draheim is working on the 2022-2023 Calendar. We will also have a person working with Richard Sargent to assist with the Google Calendar.

President Dave Stepan noted there will be a President's Conference in June 2022 in Ennis, TX. Minnesota Department of Health policies regarding COVID were discussed. We will keep our existing policies in force and continue to have takeout-only for future food events. The Board will also continue to meet virtually.

New Business: Joyce Tesarek is making volunteer lists for the Czech & Slovak Festival and Czech Roast Pork Dinner. Please contact her if you are interested.

Meeting adjourned at 9:05 p.m. The next meeting is September 16.

Czech Honorary Consul News

October 2021



Mr. Richard E. Stahl, newly retired Honorary Consul for Japan/ Minnesota, received the Order of the Rising Sun Gold Rays with Rosette from the Japanese government at a conferment ceremony, conducted by Consul General of Japan/Chicago Kenichi Okada on August 12, 2021, in the Japanese Gallery of the Minneapolis Institute of Art. Many members of the Minnesota Consular Corps attended, including Kucera.

On September 4, for the final morning of the *Kaleidoscope* of *Czech Heritage*, the special exhibit

sponsored by The Czech Heritage Club at the Arts and Heritage Center in Montgomery, Jerry Minar and Gary Pikal played their Chemnitzer-style concertinas (originating in 1834 in Saxony in eastern Germany, very close to the Czech border). Plus they explained the concertina's history and the instrument's importance in the lives of 19th and 20th century immigrant from Czech lands, Germany, and also Poland. Minar not only plays, but also makes Hengel Chemnitzer-style concertinas It takes about 250 hours to build one Hengel concertina, considered one of the finest names. In 1997 Minar purchased the Hengel name, manufacturing business, parts inventory, and specialized machinery.
