Prezidentův komentář/President's Notes by Dave Stepan

Four years ago, I was both optimistic and apprehensive as I began my role as President of Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota. After serving as Treasurer in the late 1990's, I was asked to serve in various roles on the Board of Directors, but the timing did not work for me. Today, as I write my last President's Notes, I am confident our organization continues to head in the right direction, one that provides program opportunities for both new and



long-term members in our revitalized C.S.P.S. Hall. Recognizing that no organization runs absolutely perfectly, I admit we sometimes have our challenges; but for those committed to the organization, any disputes and dissent (thankfully infrequent!) are okay when they lead to an open, productive discussion.

The COVID epidemic has been a challenge to all of us and affected much of what we could do, did do, or didn't do, programmatically in the past three years, including stopping activities inside the C.P.S.P. Hall. This created a need to be more flexible and move forward with modified programs, including successful curbside cuisine and pickup dinners. We survived the difficulties, and with careful protocols, we were able to restart the gymnastics and children's dance programs in-person ethnic dinners, and the Czech & Slovak Festival. We expanded the adult Czech and Slovak language programs with our new partners in Chicago and the Czech Republic, and we continue to coordinate with the Czech & Slovak School Twin Cities and cosponsor the Literary Ventures book discussion group. While we have not presented the *Šibřinky* Dance since 2018 or Band Blast since 2019 and the International Institute of Minnesota's Festival of Nations has been discontinued, we have created a Youth Leadership Award and the Sokol Minnesota Youth Link (SYML) group, as well as added the Kolo Sokol bike club, mushroom foraging, and recently Friendly Friday Evenings. Work is underway to digitize the historical records of the various organizations that have called the C.S.P.S Hall home. We have had to change the way we do things. While change is often difficult, mixing new programming with our primary events gives all of us opportunities to participate in a variety of activities and events.

We have an extensive list of what we have accomplished in the past four years to structurally improve, maintain, and refurbish our C.S.P.S Hall. We installed new support beams in the basement to reinforce a sagging second floor and stairway to the third floor, insulated the steam pipes, updated the fire suppression and monitoring system as well as the recently completed Hall security system. We now have a new first-floor office, updated classroom bookcases and cabinets, refinished second floor, new third floor tables and eco-shades, safer third-floor balcony railing, new more-secure parking lot side doors, new awning and new exterior grand staircase encasement, a new freezer and two new refrigerators to facilitate our dinners, two new big screen monitors for classes and presentations, an automatic external defibrillator (AED) in the second-floor dining room, a new more sanitary bottle filling station, new pallet racking for supplies for our programs and events, and strikingly-designed Sokolthemed bike racks. None of this work on the Hall could have happened without your contributions, your donations, and the grants received. Income from charitable gaming and rental of the Hall, as well as rental income from our tenant, the Pajarito restaurant, have helped finance our efforts. Income from our many successful programs and events also contribute significantly to making our organization financially sound.

For Sokol Minnesota's continued programming success and the permanency and enhanced functionality of the C.S.P.S. Hall, massive credit needs to go to our Board of Directors including our committee chairs (see the list on this page), and committee members, plus to our members, volunteers, and friends who come to events to support our great organization. We are always looking for, and thankful for, those of you willing to put your time, talent, and treasure toward the success of our Czechs and Slovak Sokol Minnesota organization that has been in existence for 140 years, for 135 years at our C.S.P.S Hall. We need you to continue to help to support Sokol, which has been in existence worldwide for 160 years. Thanks for a great ride! *Nazdar*!

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Looking for More Dancing Youth! By Louise Wessinger

On most Saturday mornings during the school year, you will find Sokol Minnesota's C.S.P.S. Hall filled with activity, including dancing. Since the *Taneční Mládež* (Dancing Youth, or TM) were founded in January of 1990, children ages four to twelve have been meeting to learn Czech and Slovak Folk Dances with their director/instructor Louise Wessinger. Miss Louise grew up dancing in Sokol Minnesota gym classes, taught second and third grade for many years, and danced from a young age with the adult Saint Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers, which she also directs. Her love of children and of dance led her to start a more continuous group of children's folk dance instruction.

After 33 years of constant growth in the numbers of dancers in the group, in March of 2020, before COVID closed most activities, there were 52 youth getting ready to perform for the Festival of Nations, including 27 in the TM dancers (kindergarten to 6th grade) and 25 in the Teen group (6th grade to 12th grade). The over two-year break because of COVID significantly decreased the number of dancers, especially in the grade school age group, where this year we have just six dancers. There are 22 dancers in the teen group. During COVID five families moved away from



dancers in the teen group. During COVID, five families moved away from the Twin Cities, which also is a factor.



We learn Czech, Moravian, and Slovak songs and folk dances. We are fortunate that over the years our *kroje* (folk dress) closet has grown to about 150 sets of *kroje* from all the regions.

Children and grandchildren of members dance for free (they pay \$10 per year to borrow a *kroj*). The fee for non-members children is \$40 per year.

This year we have begun a preschool group of dancers with their moms at 9:30 on Saturday mornings.

The grade school TM dancers meet from 9:45-10:45 and the teens from 11 to noon.

Beginning Czech students are enrolled in a course hosted by the T.G. Masaryk Czech School in Cicero, Illinois. Lecturer Kristýna Horáčková holds a degree in Czech language and literature from Charles University in Prague and has been teaching Czech to foreigners for 11 years. Kristýna says: "I like to make my lessons varied, playful, and fun. My goal is to discover and overcome language difficulties together with my students. The biggest motivation for me is the students' success and satisfaction with their own progress."

Advanced Beginning Czech (A2) students are taking a course by special arrangement with Palacký University in Olomouc. Co-instructors Jana Odevzdaná and Lenka Nosková provide lots of speaking practice and use a variety of materials and visual aids to engage students with the Czech language. Jana's extensive language teaching experience includes working with the Center for Support of Integration of Foreigners in the Czech Republic and a year of teaching in Argentina through the Czech international exchange agency DZS. Lenka is a doctoral student in the teaching of literature at Palacký University; her research focuses on innovative pedagogies to support reading literacy.

Highlights of the Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors October 2022 Meeting By Denise Stibal

The Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors meeting was called to order on October 20 at 7 p.m. Happy Birthday was sung to our October Birthday celebrants. Motion carried to accept the September minutes as edited.

A discussion on the Sokol Minnesota Bylaws was led by Steve Ernest. Steve reviewed the current bylaws with suggested corrections. There should be five Executive Directors and the list was redone to name 17 total directors. Motion carried to accept changes as recommended. Executive directors are subject to term limits (two consecutive two-year terms). The Treasurer position does not have a term limit.

Joyce Tesarek presented the Czech & Slovak Festival update. We had over 100 total volunteers, including many new volunteers. Our final net income from the event was \$13,216. The Festival Committee will meet in January to begin planning the 2023 Festival.

Budget and Finance Committee Chair Joyce Tesarek presented the Finance Committee report. For clarity and ease of tracing capital improvements, legacy building expense will be combined with building improvements. Legacy expenses can still be tracked by class. The committee will investigate hiring a bookkeeper to assist with payroll. The 2021 Form 990 was reviewed by Don Haselbauer, and he will present this at the next BOD meeting. The Pajarito lease is up for renewal and will be reviewed for end-of-year updates.

Don Haselbauer presented the Treasurer's Report and noted tax forms will be distributed as soon as they are received back from the CPA.

Financial Secretary Steve Ernest presented nine new members for approval. Our current membership is at 311.

Activities Director Jean Draheim reported the Friendly Friday Evening on October 14 was a success. Ondřej Veselý helped with the card game *mariáš*. The next event is November 11, with another card game. The last 2022 event will be December 9, no activity is decided on at this time. The 60th Anniversary Party for the Saint Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers will be November 12; tickets are available in advance or at the door. Motion carried that profits from liquor sales for this event will be donated back to Sokol Minnesota.

The Rental Committee report was given by Denise Stibal. We continue to have strong inquiries for Hall bookings. We will do a trial order of 10 new chairs and a cart to make sure they are suitable for all events and fit in the elevator. Funding for additional chairs will hopefully be provided by a grant; we will know that status in December. Dawn Bulera has found some beautiful chandeliers for the Hall which add ambiance to the event space.

Gaming Chair Ed Hamernik presented the November expense budget, motion carried to approve. Approval of transfer of \$15,000 from Gaming to the General Fund.

Corresponding Secretary: Because Mia Grignon is traveling, Arlene Hamernik reported that five cards were sent to Sokol Minnesota members.

Board of Instructors Co-Director Mary Cahill reported gymnastic class enrollment is down. Mary will attend a Sokol conference in Chicago. A District gymnastics meet will be held in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in April.

Building and Properties Committee Chair Bob Kotek reported on the parking lot repaving project. He has received one bid and is awaiting another. Motion carried to authorize not more than \$5,000 for conduit access across the parking lot for electricity. Replacement of the three south entrance doors will be done shortly. Also, a fourth door on the east side (on Western Avenue) will be replaced for environment and security reasons.

BOOK REVIEW

An Artist's Life

By Gwen Willems, Ph.D.

Aaron's Leap by Magdaléna Platzová, translated by Craig Cravens. Bellevue Literary Press: New York, 2014, 224 pages. Originally published in Czech in 2006. Available at libraries and bookstores.

Magdaléna Platzová offers a lauded example of contemporary Czech literature. She has published a children's book, a young adult nonfiction book, short stories, plays, and several novels. *Aaron's Leap*, her first book translated into English, is a Lidové Noviny Book of the Year Award finalist. *The Frankfurter Allgemeine Zeitung* praised

it as a novel that "must be counted among the best written by contemporary Czech writers." The author was raised in Prague, now lives in Lyon, France, and has also lived in Washington, DC, and New York City.

Aaron's Leap is a fictional novel about Berta Altmann inspired by the real-life story of Bauhaus artist Friedl Dicker-Brandeis, who taught art to children at the Nazi transport camp at Terezin and died at Auschwitz. We get to know Berta through the investigation of her life by a contemporary Israeli documentary film crew. Add to that the reminiscences of Berta's friend and fellow artist Kristýna Hládková and Berta's diaries. Despite Platzová's skill as a

writer, she has taken on too much in one book. It is sometimes confusing as the book takes us back and forth in time, place, and between characters. It is also all presented in first person. A helpful addition would be brief descriptions of the famous artists and art movements of the time that got short shrift in the book. A subplot entangling Kristýna's granddaughter Milena and Aaron, the Israeli cameraman, is distracting and over-complicating to Berta's story. However, his option to "leap" into love gives the book its name.

The reader's earliest view of Berta Altmann is a few days before the First World War is declared, when Berta is coming into her own. Platzová wrote that Berta is "A girl in Vienna, 1914. She's just turned fourteen. She grew up without a mother and feels more mature than her peers. And more alone. Disjointedly, but all the more intensively, she perceives everything going on around her. She doesn't think about it. She drinks in everything, like a mushroom, without discrimination, without a teacher; she hungers for everything that resonates with her inner pulsation, with her longing, with her trepidation."



Her father recognizes Berta's creativity and steers her in the practical direction of photography, which she enjoys. She studies it for two years, and then applies to the Academy of Fine Arts, where she concentrates on weaving, designing patterns, and handling different materials. The people she meets and her experiences open a wide world of art for her, leading eventually to her teaching.

In this passage from Berta's journal, she is reinforcing her belief in the crucial role of art and the importance of her teaching it: "Art assuages and illuminates their lives; it illuminates them from the everyday grueling banality, the

> dirt, the struggle for basic necessities. I myself know well enough how grueling this struggle is! And how much a flash of beauty, of color, of understanding, a glimpse of another world can give someone who trudges day after day with his eyes fixed on the tips of his shoes. I want to believe that this experience can lead them further, like a lucky star. Especially for a child."

> The complicated plots cover a century of Central European history. They show how Berta's experiences with the European Modernist movement, her lovers, and fellow artists affected her. In her diary, she records all of this, including the end of the Austro-Hungarian Empire and the establishment of the Austrian Communist Party.


We follow Berta to Berlin, where she joins a commune based on Bauhaus thinking.

Berta gets married to a Jew, Milan Drůza, in Prague Town Hall in 1936 and becomes a Czech citizen. Platzová wrote beautifully of how "Berta most likes taking walks along the river, across levees, bridges, and islands. The gulls flying above the Moldau create the illusion of being near the sea and the open, distant horizon. Here, Prague is not small and cramped, one can breathe freely. Toward evening, the surface of the water is festively silvered, the lamps lit up; welldressed people are heading to the theater or the Žofín Palace. Trams jangle, and a cool wind blows from the wooded slopes of Petřín Hill. For a moment, the dark stone of the castle retains its reddish tinge, then the west turns yellow, green, then pales, and the first star appears overhead."

As she approaches the peak of her artistic talent, Berta is condemned to Terezín (1942) and Auschwitz (1944) because of the company she keeps, her belief in helping others, and thus her reluctance to flee when she could.

The parish, organized in 1856, is among the oldest in the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis; it is the oldest Czech parish.
