Have you heard of the Hopkins Raspberry Festival parade? It is an annual

tradition with Czech-linked roots that I have fond memories of attending as a child. I am half Czech through four great-grandparents, with the earliest arriving in Minnesota in the Hopkins area in 1855. Czech culture was not a direct part of my upbringing. However, I did pick berries as a young teen at one of the Bren berry farms in Hopkins (the Brens were one of many Czech families in the area), which involved starting the day by joining my sisters and neighbors in hopping in the back of a flat-bed truck at 6 a.m. My memories of participating in these activities Tom Aubrecht contributed to my interest in Czech culture.

My first connection with Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota was through my taking a koláče baking class given by Georgiana Dolejsi and Florence Haselbauer in the early 1990s. My late dearest wife Judy's and my daughters, Kate (Aubrecht) Gilman and Jen Aubrecht Massey, danced with the Taneční Mládež and Taneční Teens for approximately 10 years each. Jen also danced one year with the adult Saint Paul Czech and Slovak Folk Dancers before moving to California. Judy and Kate visited the Czech Republic in 1996 with a Venture Scout group from Sokol Minnesota. I traveled to the Czech Republic in 2000 as a chaperone for Jen, two other Saint Paul girls, and one from Chicago who participated in a multi-faceted three-week international Sokol camp and tour. Jen and I were fortunate to visit two of our family's ancestral villages, Borova and Široký Důl, in Moravia near the camp, thanks to one of the leaders. Our group, along with other Sokols from Minnesota, also participated in the International Slet, which led to two of my key memories of the trip. One memory was marching in the Slet parade with the United States contingent and seeing the tears of some of the Czech senior women attendees as we went by. The second vivid memory was marching under the stands into the Slet stadium singing Kde domov můj (the Czech national anthem) and hearing our voices reverberate.

When Jen got her driver's license, Judy and I joined the adult dance group. Despite my being barely able to polka in a straight line when we started (many thanks for your patience, Louise!), we enjoyed practicing and performing with the group for 15 years and touring the Czech Republic with the group in 2012. On each trip our family took, we were most glad to see many cultural, historic, and natural sites throughout the Czech Republic. Judy and I retired from the dance group in 2020.

Like many of you, I have volunteered with Sokol Minnesota in a variety of ways. Much of my volunteering has been on the periphery of our dinners and events, but the volunteers that are heavily involved in organizing our activities on an ongoing basis are amazing. Judy, who was not Czech or Slovak, volunteered in several key roles for Sokol Minnesota, including as president for five years (Slovo, March 2021). Volunteering in any capacity with Sokol Minnesota is a great way to connect with people and with our shared culture and history.

My more formal roles for Sokol Minnesota included the Board of Directors positions of Member-at-Large. Sergeant at Arms (no need for being a "bouncer," thankfully), Treasurer, and Financial Secretary (membership records). I am finishing my fifth year as Slovo co-managing editor and copy editor. I am honored to work on the Slovo to assist in promoting and documenting the organizers' efforts on, and attendees' participation in, our physical, educational, cultural, and social programs. The Slovo would not be possible without the outstanding and muchappreciated efforts of the many contributors, the reviewers of the draft issues (I especially appreciate the assistance with the finer, or even not-so-fine, points of grammar), and the Slovo team (see the list on page 13). I had several careers, resulting from getting to know myself better over the years and from keeping up with rapidly changing information technology. I worked in city and regional planning in Ohio, Maple Grove, and Milwaukee (earning a Masters at Rutgers along the way); as a research analyst for two State of Minnesota departments and the University of Minnesota School of Public Health; and as an application software developer or IT Quality Assurance (QA) Analyst for several Twin Cities Fortune 500 companies. While I retired in 2016, my work as Slovo copy editor ties in with my QA background as well as my Gallup Strengthsfinder tool's top strength of Maximizer (take something good and make it better).

My current hobbies include the adult dance group (I rejoined a year ago and I am finding it has not gotten any easier than when we retired), golf (I started as a caddy), walking (during which I sometimes write haiku), Tai Chi (I may join the new Wednesday evening group), and riding both my indoor exercise bike and my new e-bike. I enjoy reading history of all time periods, historical novels, and biographies, as well as keeping up with the news. I readily purchase discount books on historic, natural, art, and technical topics, which I read as a way to keep my mind fresh.



Sokol Minnesota Fun Run/Walk Celebrates 1918 Independence By Steve Ernest

Despite the temperature hovering around freezing, 19 hearty souls enjoyed the Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota fun run/walk on October 28 to mark the 105th anniversary of the founding of the first modern Czech and Slovak republic. The October 28, 1918, creation of Czechoslovakia joined Bohemia, Moravia, Slovakia Silesia, and Carpathian Ruthenia in an independent country. Czech and Slovak Sokol members of those days were strong contributors to the events that made independence possible. The fun run/walk was held in coordination with the international Sokol *Běh Republiky* (Run of the Republic) activities, which are done partly in remembrance of the events more than a hundred years ago. The two-kilometer course went around the C.S.P.S. Hall neighborhood and included part of the Little Bohemia Trail.

Student Archivists Dig Deep Into Sokol Minnesota Archives By Dave Stepan

The visiting students and teachers from Ždar nád Sazavou, Czech Republic, returned home on October 19. For more information on their visit, see the associated article in the November *Slovo* on page 5 and teachers Petra Stárková's and Martina Janurová's post-trip article on their school website www.bigyzr.cz/clanek/expedice-usa (if needed, use a browser that provides a translation). Thanks to the efforts of the students, Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota now has a translated copy of the book "Sokol St Paul, Minn" minutes 1882-1890. Based on the June 13, 1882, minutes that refer to a "previous Sokol," it is possible our organization is even older than 1882, which was thought to be our year of origin. A note from the February 25, 1887, minutes refers to V. Picha speaking to Mr. Pozdena on the matter of the newspaper article about the beginnings of Sokol. Perhaps finding this newspaper article might clarify the issue. The book translated includes Sokol meeting minutes from 1882, 1883, 1884, 1887, 1888, 1889, and 1890. The book has no minutes from 1885-1886. It is indicated at the meeting of September 29, 1884, that the Sokol unit might have been disbanded as it was agreed to move all Sokol furniture (equipment?) to the hall of Sokol member Vaclav Picha. On February 18, 1887, the St Paul Sokol re-established itself and on March 21, 1887, Sokol Saint Paul changed its name to Sokol Žižka. But again, at a special meeting on October 1, 1890, the eight members in attendance voted to donate the remaining \$78.17 in the treasury and the Sokol tools (gym equipment?) to the Rad Čech c.12 C.S.P.S. until a future date when "at least 20 members and a trainer can be organized."

"I believe this translation of the earliest minutes will add important details to the history of our organization," Dr. Lukas Perutka of Charles University in Prague noted, when he was copying the pages of this same book, and that there were gaps in our history and that many organizations created by immigrant communities had the challenge to interest new members. That challenge continues to this day, but if it weren't for the perseverance of those early members to continue the effort, we wouldn't be in existence today. Today we are fortunate that the relative affluence of our current society has allowed you as members to support our Sokol Minnesota programs at the C.S.P.S Hall. In the 1880's, I can imagine the struggle to earn a living was, perhaps, more important than participation in Sokol activities.

Additional work needs to be done with this book, including compiling a complete list of all individuals mentioned; both members and non-members. The plan is to share all of this information in more detail with Sokol Minnesota members and the community at large. In addition to the translation work, we also now have a digital print of all of the Thomas Edison "type" music rolls that have been stored at C.S.P.S. Hall. There is interest in the rolls from Filip Šír, Coordinator for the

Digitalization and New Media Department of the National Museum in the Czech Republic.

We also have new digital copies of miscellaneous (untranslated) correspondence from Vaclav Picha and miscellaneous unidentified pictures.

Highlights of the Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors October 2023 Meeting

The Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota Board of Directors October 19, 2023, meeting was called to order by Vice President Lucy Rose at 7 p.m.

Discussion was again held on the Slovak-centered dance group *Holubica's* hope for a formal relationship with Sokol Minnesota.

The 2026 American Sokol Convention Co-chairs, to be held in Minnesota, are Mary Cahill and Joan Sedlacek.

The October 28 Czech and Slovak Independence Day run/walk was discussed.

Membership Director Steve Ernest presented eight applications for membership, which were approved (see article on page 8). Sokol Minnesota now has 308 members.

Mary Cahill and Jason Brozovich noted for the Board of Instructors that gymnastics classes are going well. There are over 10 students in the Tuesday 4- 6-year-old class. Other classes have more modest numbers, but new inquiries are coming in. The search is ongoing for a coach to primarily help with the more advanced classes. The Western District Gymnastics Competition will be held at Sokol South Omaha on April 27, 2024. Kung Fu and Tai Chi classes have been slowly gaining participants. The *XVII All Sokol Slet* in Prague will be June 30 to July 5, 2024. Three different calisthenic routines ("cals") will be performed at the *Slet*. Several Sokol members from Chicago area have committed to learning and performing a cal at the *Slet*, and one member has committed from the Western District.

Education Director Sally Lieberman noted 45 students are enrolled in language classes: 28 in Czech, 17 in Slovak. All classes met the four-student minimum. One class is over the 10-student maximum. Of the online students, 14 out of 32 are from outside the metro area, primarily from outside Minnesota, with beginning Slovak accounting for the largest share of out-of-state students.

The *Second Life of Vendulka V.* exhibition at the C.S.P.S. Hall during the Festival was visited by approximately 100 people.

The author, journalist Ondřej Kundra, was at the Festival and gave two talks during the week prior, one on the Vendulka V. project, the other on his reporting on the war in Ukraine. Both talks were attended by approximately a dozen people. We cosponsored Kundra's visit with the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center of Minnesota.

Possible future activities include:

•Screening of Mara Pelecis film about Latvian independence.

•An online informational session on summer study programs in the Czech Republic (Poděbrady, etc) will be held in early February.

•Cooking classes: a possible dumpling mini-series in late winter/early spring.

•Bohemian Flats Park tour and talk in May; see page 6.

Denise Stibal noted for the Rental Committee that rental inquiries continue to come in steadily.

Finance Committee chair Joyce Tesarek reported that the Czech & Slovak Festival did very well financially.

Building and Trustees Committee Chair Bob Kotek noted that planting trees on the west side of the parking lot is planned before cold weather sets in. Installing a remote access thermostat is planned to better control the temperature of the C.S.P.S. Hall.

Gaming Manager Ed Hamernik presented requests for approval. The November Expense Budget was approved.

The September Actual Operation Summary was approved. Transfer of \$10,000 to the General Fund in October was approved, as was an appropriate transfer in December.

Activities Director Jeannie Draheim noted there are 81 registrations for the Czech schnitzel dinner (see page 3).

2024 calendar event dates have been proposed and were discussed. Dates will not be publicized unless there is an event chair/organizer. The Dvořák Visit Celebration on September 17 was recapped.

Joyce Tesarek reported on account balances for Treasurer Don Haselbauer.

Slovo Publication Information and Committees

Karel Čapek Explores Spain

Letters from Spain by Karel Čapek, translated by Paul Selver. Geoffrey Bles: London, 1931 in English, 196 pages; 1930 in Czech. Available at libraries and bookstores.

Letters from Spain is third in the series of five travel books by beloved author Karel Čapek. It was published in Czechoslovakia in 1930 and in English translation the following year. The title is misleading, at least in the

English edition, since the book is a collection of essays, not letters. Approaching this book, the reader needs to remain aware that Čapek's observations and stories are plucked from a very specific time and place.

He begins the book as his trip begins, with train rides across multiple countries to get to Spain. Are you up for train trivia, such as fake luggage labels, fast vs. slow trains, bunk beds?

"My poetical friends, let me tell you the plain truth about Pullmans and Sleepings Cars," Čapek writes. "If you must know they look infinitely more enticing from outside, when they flash

past some sleepy little station than from within. It is true that they make up for this by their tremendous speed, but it is no less true that all the same you are boxed up in them for fourteen or even twenty-three blessed hours at a stretch, and as a rule that's enough to bore you stiff.... Confound it all, thinks the man in the Pullman, where are we? What, only Bordeaux? Good Lord, this is a slow business."

He reminded me of the unexpected reality of my train ride across Spain many years ago. I was twenty-one, on winter break from university, and coming back from Morocco to Germany. After many hours riding, I found out how ridiculously slow and long the train ride would be across Spain, but fortunately I could change plans and hop a plane halfway across Spain to make sure I didn't miss my international flight home


Čapek tells a humorous tale of the "complicated adventure" it is to get into the upper berth of a sleeping train car, especially when someone is already asleep in the lower one. "It is somewhat disconcerting," he writes, "to trample on the head and abdomen of a person whose nationality and character are alike unknown to you." He suggests different methods for maneuvering up to the top bunk and warns you to not get thirsty or anything of the sort which would involve climbing down.

Throughout his vast writings, the author retains his fascination and admiration for nationhood. "Spain has not yet ceased to be in close touch with nature," Čapek writes, "and has still not lost sight of its history; that is why it has managed to preserve itself to such an extent. And all that the rest of us can do is to observe, with a certain amount of wonder, how fine a thing it is to be a nation."

Passages in the book focus on a variety of topics-cities

and regions; artists (work by Goya, El Greco, Velázquez); well-known, traditional, cultural aspects of Spain, such as bullfighting, flamenco dancing, and mantillas; and *rejas*, the metal-work lattices on buildings. He includes descriptions of his favorite topics—gardens and food—as well. Each province had its own wines and different sorts of fish and cheese, sausage, beans, melons, olives, grapes, sweetmeats, and "other local gifts of God."

in the shambles by being banged on the head with a bludgeon! Would that be more humane than for him to perish this way in a fight, as befits his mettlesome and pugnacious heart? Well, I don't know...."

To Čapek, a Spanish garden was "an artificial paradise" and "an intimate dream." As a passionate gardener, he found the Spanish gardens consisted of three things: (1) greenery including cypresses, clipped box-trees, myrtle, privet, laurel, holly, lauroceras, honeysuckle, diverse shrubs, and on and on; (2) flagstones, ricks, glazed tiles, majolica flights of steps, seats, fountains, jets, balconies, pergolas, balustrades, and on and on, and (3) a most luxuriant jungle.

Tourism can surprise you. An exact model of the Santa Maria, on which Christopher Columbus came to America, was available for touring. Čapek looked it over, top to bottom, and laid on the bed in Columbus's cabin. He wasn't inspired. He even "meddled with the falconetas or culebrinas or whatever they call those old cannons, during which process I nearly broke my leg with an iron bullet, for they were loaded; but I discovered nothing except my own astonishment at finding the famous ship so small."
