

April will be another exciting month for Sokol Minnesota. We are extremely honored that the Prime Minister of the Czech Republic, Bohuslav Sobotka is coming to the C.S.P.S. Hall on Saturday, April 2, in the afternoon. The Prime Minister is eager to know more about Czech-Americans and to learn about the programs and activities that take place in Minnesota related to Czech culture and education, as well as to promote business and trade opportunities. He served as chairman of the Czech Social Democratic Party beginning in 2011 and was appointed Prime Minister of the Czech Republic in 2014. The Prime Minister and his wife Olga Sobotková have two school-aged sons. The family lives in the official residence of the prime minister, Kramářova vila, located in the Hradčany area of Prague.

During the Prime Minister's visit to the C.S.P.S. Hall, the program will include brief remarks and entertainment, followed by a reception. Members of the Czech community have been busy preparing for this event. Many people are expected to attend this event to show support for the Czech community and to enjoy this wonderful opportunity to meet Prime Minister Sobotka and the group traveling with him. Czech films are again being presented at the Trylon Microcinema. *Alice* and *Invention for Destruction* will be shown there on April 1, 2, and 3. The Trylon is the Twin Cities first microcinema and has only 50 seats. Additional Czech films can be seen later in April at the International Film Festival at the Saint Anthony Main Theatre in Minneapolis. Sokol Minnesota is a sponsor of both of these film series. C.S.P.S. Hall Restoration Fire Escape Project Needs Your Help

The latest restoration project that we are addressing is the fire escape from the main hall (second floor). The fire inspector has determined that the wooden portion of the current stairs has deteriorated and must be replaced. We have contacted city departments and worked out the following process:

- 1. Obtain structural analysis of steel portion of stairs.
- 2. Select temporary scaffold stairs to rent and install immediately for safe egress during rebuild.
- 3. Develop preliminary plans for permanent egress which will include rework of existing shed (also deteriorated) for basement steps enclosures.

With city departments approval of these steps, we can then contact architects/designers to complete the plans and begin the rebuild.

This is an extensive and expensive project. Estimates for the first phase are around \$5,000. You can support this project with a donation in one of the following ways:

Greetings from Your Czech Honorary Consul...... Marit Lee Kucera

Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota is unique among all Sokol units in the United States. It has two honorary consuls, one representing the Czech Republic and one representing the Slovak Republic. This April issue inaugurates my first column in Slovo as the Honorary Czech Consul. My colleague Don Pafko, Honorary Consul of the Slovak Republic in Minnesota, and I plan to write monthly columns.

Last month, the March Slovo had a two-page picture essay, expertly assembled by Martina Gurgel, of the Installation Ceremony on December 5, 2015, for the Honorary Consul of the Czech Republic for Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, and South Dakota. The official title is Honorary Consulate of the Czech Republic in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The office is located in the C.S.P.S. Sokol building in Saint Paul. Currently the office is open by appointment. My phone number is 651-238-0447.

Vintage Czech Beads and Buttons





The Textile Center, a national center for fiber arts in Minneapolis, held a "Viintage Camp" in mid-February. The dress is probably not worth restoring, but parts of it can be used to make a belt, a Boho evening bag, or panels in a vest or jacket. Merry Jo Thoele (Minnesota State Button Society) had handpainted Czech glass buttons on the original card for sale. 



comfort zone. Drama and humor intertwine as Vlasta realizes, for the first time in her life, that she might need some care, too.

Aferim! (2015. 106 minutes, Romanian with subtitles), directed by Radu Jude. Saturday, April 9, 9:20 p.m. and

Thursday, April 21, 4:44 p.m. Two riders cross a barren landscape in the middle of Wallachia, Eastern Europe, 1835. Gendarme Costandin and his son. are searching for a Gypsy slave who has run away from his nobleman master and is suspected of having an affair with the noble's wife. On their odyssey they encounter people of different nationalities



and beliefs: Turks and Russians, Christians and Jews, Romanians and Hungarians. Each harbors prejudices against the others. When the slave Carfin is found, the adventure is far from over. A harsh history lesson leavened by bawdy humor and classic Wild West elements, *Aferim!* dramatizes the formerly taboo subject of gypsy slavery that flourished in Romania for centuries, and was only finally abolished in 1856. MOVIE REVIEW: I Served The King of England By Cinnamon Whaley

Available via Netflix, Rated R

Jan Dítě has just gotten out of prison after 15 years. As he walks away from the prison, we are quickly brought into Jan's past through a series of flashbacks, visiting him when he was young and starting his career as an apprentice server in a hotel bar. We learn that he had dreams of being rich, of owning his own hotel one day. We follow him through his career full of comical luck, to more and more fantastic hotels, until Jan finds himself at the best hotel in Prague, the Hotel Paris, where he is promoted to Front Waiter and serves the emperor of Ethiopia, even coming away with a royal sash.

It is while he is at the Hotel Paris that, soon after Hitler has come to power, he meets a lovely German girl who convinces him to look into his genealogical past as she is sure there is good German blood in him. He fibs a bit, passes an intense physical exam, and they're married. A Czech and a German, in German-controlled Czechoslovakia. Jan does come to own a hotel, but after the end of the war, his luck runs out.

I Served The King of England was a joy to watch. Jan's nuances, such as the joy he gets from watching well-off people leap at pocket change on the floor, and the fact that he always gets the girl even though he's quite petite and often ignored in crowds. There are reoccurring scenes such as the pocket change trick and some characters who return again and again at key moments, these gems really tie the movie together for me. There is a scene with roughly 60 waiters all moving in unison with beautiful choreography. Watcher beware, there is a good deal of nudity, mostly in surreal, unexpected scenes.

There is so much in this film to laugh about and look at, that the underlying story of a Czech who falls in love with a German who is completely dedicated to Hitler surfaces more after the movie is over and there is time to reflect on what that must have been like at the time. It's somewhat uncomfortable looking back, but as it was happening, as it surely was for some people, what was it like? Through Jan's eyes we simply see a man in love.

The Cross of Číhošť By Vanda Kofroňová, columnist from Prague

Josef Toufar was a Roman Catholic priest tortured to death by communist agents during the government investigation of so-called *Číhošť* miracle. Let me introduce his story to you today, as those terrible things happened exactly 65 years ago.

At that time, the independent Catholic Church was considered a danger for the newly-established communist state.

During a church service in December 1949 in the village of Číhošť, the parishioners saw a huge iron cross standing on the main altar bend several times on its own, and afterwards they told Father Toufar, who had been facing the parishioners and had not seen the cross move.

Soon after that SNB (Czechoslovak National Security Corps) officers came to the village and examined the church. Toufar was immediately suspicious – it was illegal to cause or even witness a miracle at that time, as the Soviets said people did not need miracles. However, the citizens did not agree. The news spread quickly. The church became a popular place for visitors and many people came there to talk to the priest. A photographer who was present and said he saw no evidence of fraud was later sentenced to 13 years in prison.

Although Toufar never claimed a miracle had occurred, instead deferring to the church to investigate, he was arrested and subjected to severe beatings. The SNB demanded that he confess to having faked the miracle by installing a mechanical device that moved the cross, but he refused. He was so severely injured that he could barely talk or move his limbs. He was again brutally tortured and police finally made him sign a confession. Only then was he admitted to a hospital, where he soon died from his injuries and was buried in a mass grave. The government used the incident to accuse and try other priests in an effort to discourage faith in religion.

Fr. Toufar was fully rehabilitated by the Czech government only in 1998. In 2013, the Czech Bishops' Conference announced the start of the process for his beatification. This year a new book about his life was published.

On February 22, more than 500 people from around the Czech Republic gathered in Číhošť to commemorate the 65th anniversary of his murder.

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BOOK REVIEW: Václav Havel's Extraordinary Life By Gwen Willems, Ph.D.

Havel: A Life. Michael Žantovský. New York: Grove Press. 2014, 543 pages. Available in bookstores and libraries.

As a former press secretary, advisor, political director, and long-time close friend of Václav Havel's, author Michael Žantovský gives us an up-close and detailed view of Havel from his privileged youth through his days as playwright, political activist, and Charter 77 dissident, to president of Czechoslovakia and then the Czech Republic.

The author includes information gathered through his first-hand experiences, access to private letters, and many interviews. Although other books might focus more on criticism of Havel's political actions, it is hard to imagine a more superbly comprehensive book. While several biographies were published during Havel's life, this book was released in 2014, three years after Havel's death, and has the advantage of examining the entirety of his life.

I consider Havel one of the most significant thinkers, writers, and politicians of our time, an imperfect man who was internationally admired and beloved for his courageous stances and attempts to bring human rights and democracy to Czech lands.

Havel was many things, including doubtful and self-critical. In his autobiography, *To the Castle and Back*, Havel describes his "insignificance: as a bourgeois child, a laboratory assistant, a soldier, a stagehand, a playwright, a dissident, a prisoner, a president, a pensioner, a public phenomenon, and a hermit, an alleged hero but secretly a bundle of nerves …" He was also engaging, a man described by Žantovský as "thriving on company, the heart and soul of the party, winning friendship easily and returning it in abundance."

He was a consummate moral and political leader of the twentieth century, a man of high ideals and great vision. His frequent discussion of moral philosophies focused on three concepts—belief in the power of the powerless, living in truth, and responsibility. By the age 10, he already felt ambition and responsibility to "repair the world" when he envisaged a factory that manufactured "good" rather than goods. When he was 12, his family was blacklisted following the communist coup of 1948. Havel wrote poetry in his youth and later social commentary in essays and absurdist plays. As a leading participant in the Prague Spring, his work was censored, and his dissident activities led to several prison stints, totaling about five years.

The clear writing of *Havel: A Life* is enhanced with a long bibliography, extensive index, and numerous photographs of Havel with family, friends, political dignitaries, musicians, and other notable people. The book was chosen as a *New York Times* Editors' Choice and a *Guardian* Best Book of the Year.

Although Havel and Žantovský remained friends until Havel's death, Žantovský left the president's office in 1992 at the end of Havel's second term because of differing views on the presidency. Žantovský thought Havel needed to organize large numbers of his supporters and admirers into an effective political force to have real impact on the political and social development of the country. Žantovský went on to serve as Czech Ambassador to Washington and Tel Aviv, and currently is Czech Ambassador to the Court of Saint James and president of the Aspen Institute Prague.
