



### More Clues to the Meaning of Your Bohemian Village Name

The linden tree (lipa) has long been associated with Bohemia. It is found everywhere in the Czech Republic and appears on the state seal. References to it are found in many place names: *Lipno* in Czech or *Lippen* in German with 3 derivations, and 54 occurrences. Another tree, the yew (*jiva*), with derivations occurs over 10 times in place



names. One example would be Jivjany located in west Bohemia south of Střibro and north of Horšovský Týn. Soil conditions played a part in how places were named. *Slatina* means swampy place; boggy ground. *Slatina* and its derivatives appear in place names in Bohemia, Moravia, as well as in the Slovak Republic. In older times settlements established on swampy, marshy land offered some protection from enemies. The related adjective *blatná* means swampy, filthy village which does not sound very complimentary. By adding the suffix, -ice it becomes a noun or Blatnice. There are over 20 locations in Bohemia with parts of the root word blatná/bláto in their name.

These are just a few examples taken from a publication in the CGSI library titled *The Place Names of Bohemia; Their History, Derivation and Meaning* translated by Karen Hobbs from published articles by Paul Brostean and Dr. Ernst Richter –with also a little help from Google. 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

### **Reflections on Reflections**

Nothing is simple nowadays, not even reflections on last year, the theme of this issue of Slovo. The problem is that each time I reflect on an event, it has an antecedent that, in turn, has another. Hence the title - "reflections"

on reflections". For example, one of the most memorable events of last year was the invitation to attend the first ever meeting of all Czech Honorary Consuls from around the world held in the memorable Černin Palace. I used to visit this incredible building during my student days in Prague because I was interested in joining the Czechoslovak diplomatic service after graduation from the Charles University. This brought the memories of the February '48 communist putsch, the death of Jan Masaryk, my escape, and eventually a new life in a new country. I stood at the place where Masaryk's body was found, and wondered how different things may have been had he resigned his post along with other non-communist ministers, an event that may have permitted national elections in which I would have been on the ballot representing university students. I was not supposed to be invited, having officially retired from the position of the Honorary Consul on May 9th in order for Robert Vanasek to be invited. However, Ambassador Kolař fought for an exception that made it possible for both of us to go – for which I am exceptionally grateful.

Retiring from the Honorary Consulate gave me another reason to reflect on the ten years I had one leg in the diplomatic service, one leg in my academic field, international education, and one leg in everything else. My mother was convinced that I was born with three legs, all kicking vigorously at birth, presumably to get faster run on life. All three legs are still kicking: instead of the Honorary Consulate, I am remaining active in Sokol's building drive and in the Czech and Slovak Cultural Center, and still give guest lectures, advise students, and consult with universities around the world on meeting the requirements of global knowledge.

The "third leg" is my metaphor for "knowledge". I made more trips to Prague last year; each time I find bookstores and publishers exploding with new titles bringing insights and information that remains largely unnoticed to most of us. An example is a new book about the exceptional support provided by American Sokol to Tomas G. Masaryk – support that is nowhere to be found today.

The new knowledge is so extensive that it creates an information overload, prompting one writer to claim that the changes in the world place an incredible pressure on our cognitive resources that we have difficulties absorbing. Yet our brains are capable of absorbing more than we do, if we keep on learning and thus re-training our brains. We face a "knowledge gap" between what we know and what we should know, that calls for a program that fills that gap. Such program, modeled on a similar effort of the National Library and Museum in Cedar Rapids. is now being planned and will offer a series of seminar/lectures on the meaning of the Twentieth Century. Watch for announcements soon.

Reflections focus on the past, yet it is the future in which we will spend the rest of our lives. Consequently they are relevant to the future over which we might have some control.

### Sister Joan Sedlacek made Sokol Honorary Member

Editor's note: On Sunday, December 7, 2008 Sister Joan Sedlacek was made an Honorary Member of Czech and Slovak Sokol Minnesota, reflecting contributions over 32 years of service. This is a summary of Sis. Jeanette Pafko's presentation of Sis. Sedlacek's service.

Since her induction in December 1976 Sister Joan Sedlacek has served our unit in many capacities. She has:

- Served as First Vice President, Sergeant at Arms, Women's Director, Educational Director, Board of Trustees with volunteer work throughout the hall planting trees, painting walls and refinishing floors and generally keeping the facility in good order besides generously donating time and monies to various construction projects.
- Participated in calisthenics and many Slets throughout the US and world, including Fort Worth, Chicago, Omaha, Montreal, Toronto, Vienna, Indianapolis, Prague, and the first Slovak Sokol Slet in Kosice, Slovakia.
- Lectured widely on Sokol programs and halls including the Czech & Slovak Museum & Library, and has organized cultural displays for the Centennial and 125th celebrations, and compiled comprehensive list of Sokol units and buildings and collected photos of buildings in the US and Czech Republic and Slovak Republic.
- Chaired and worked dinners and festivals, including the Festival of Nations food and culture booths, as well as the gift shop
- Rewrote the Sokol educational manual and children's calisthenics program, taught the "Tots" (and even was a member of a class!), served as camp and junior counselor, and Venture Scout advisor.
- Served as Western District historian, and the American Sokol Organization as Membership Chair and Educational Director. She represented Sokol Minnesota at the American Sokol 125th Anniversary, Sokol New York 125th Anniversary, Sokol West Suburban 25th Anniversary.
